February General Manager's Report

After an unusually wet December, January and early February has been exceptionally dry. Lake Berryessa storage has essentially not changed since the end of December. However, even if it does not rain any more this year, water storage will be about where we were last year at the end of spring. What looked like a promising water year, may turn out to be just an average year. Our State Water Project allocation remains at 40% with no increase in January and likely no increase in February. Even with this dry weather, we do not predict any water shortages this year.

At this meeting we will focus on what is happening in the Delta. 2013 and 2014 will be pivotal for the future of the Delta. The Bay Delta Conservation Plan will be subject to much debate in 2013 and 2014 and brings some threats and opportunities to Solano. We will discuss how the public agencies in Solano County are positioning ourselves to best address our interests in the Delta.

SUBJECT: Delta Report

I will be giving the Board a briefing on current issues in the Delta. The purpose of the briefing is to keep the Board informed of key activities having the potential to impact Solano County. We want to reaffirm the Board's policy and strategic direction on these complex and ever changing matters.

Of particular interest is the complete administrative draft of the Bay Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP) that will be released sometime in February. The official public draft BDCP and the draft EIR/EIS is not planned to be issued until summer 2013. There have been many delays in the BDCP. Most of the delays are due to dealing with the scientific uncertainty of how delta fish species will react to the physical changes proposed in BDCP.

The BDCP could have major impacts on Solano County because it calls for tens of thousands of acres of tidal wetland habitat in the Cache Slough and Suisun Marsh areas of Solano County. If not done right, this amount of land conversion could have negative impact on the agricultural economy of the County. There are also concerns about the impact of the Cache Slough habitat projects on the water quality and pumping ability of the North Bay Aqueduct.

There have been some recent alternatives, or variations, to BDCP that have been proposed. I will discuss these and how they may affect the BDCP decision making process.

SCWA staff (and County staff) has been working with BDCP to inform them of our concerns. There is still time to address them in the BDCP process. One key effort is the Cache Slough Study. Bill Emlen, Director of the Solano County Resource Management Department, will brief the Board on this important study that is being conducted by Solano County and funded (\$100,000) by the State and Federal water contractors. SCWA has contributed \$25,000 to the study. The Cache



Slough Study will be a focused look at how tidal wetland restoration could be done in Solano County to minimize minimal local impacts and will start to look at the local economic impacts of these types of projects.

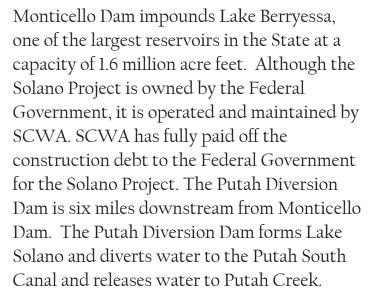

- State funding for invasive mussel species at Lake Berryessa is needed. AB 2443 from the last Legislative session will provide a reliable funding source for these programs.
- Lake Berryessa has a high risk of invasive mussel infestation due to its water chemistry and high recreation use.

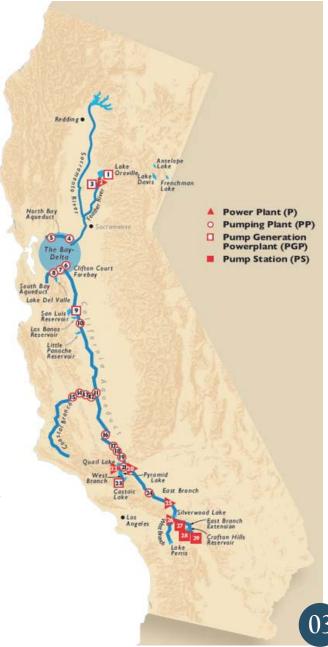

SCWA works closely with other State Water Project contractors and the California Department of Water Resources on improving the water supply reliability of the Project and managing Project costs. SCWA and our cities have augmented their State Water Project supplies by securing additional water supplies through water rights permits, asserting area of origin rights and water purchases.

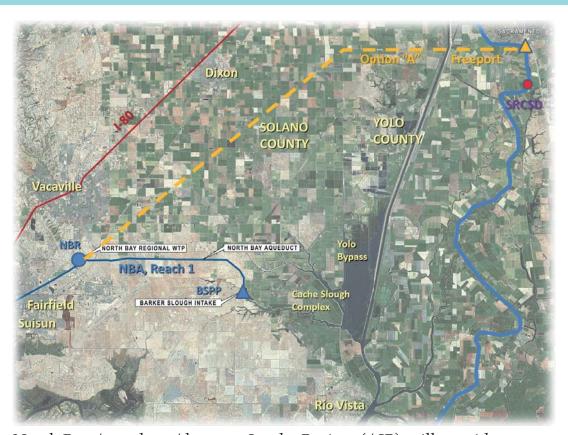
Key Issues:

- The Department of Water Resources has inadequate staff resources to properly manage the complex State Water Project.
- State contracting and personnel restrictions result in recruitment and retention problems with DWR staff. This causes inefficiencies in operating and maintaining SWP facilities, including the North Bay Aqueduct.

The North Bay Aqueduct of the State Water Project currently serves the cities of Vallejo, Benicia, Fairfield and Vacaville along with cities in Napa County. The Barker Slough Pumping Plant pumps from the Delta to an underground pipeline that goes through Solano County into Napa County. On average about 40,000 acre feet per year is delivered to Solano cities from the State Water Project.



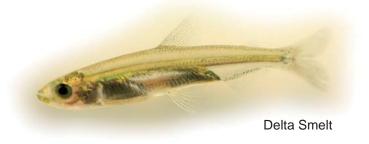
NORTH BAY AQUEDUCT ALTERNATE INTAKE PROJECT



The North Bay Aqueduct Alternate Intake Project (AIP) will provide a more reliable and higher quality water supply to SCWA cities and Napa County. The North Bay Aqueduct Pumping Plant pumps from Cache Slough and suffers from poor water quality (turbidity and organic carbon) and has pumping restrictions due to the presence of endangered species (Delta smelt and longfin smelt). The State of California has designated Cache Slough as a prime area for tidal wetlands habitat restoration for the benefit of endangered species that will increase organic carbon (for the fish food chain) and the presence of endangered species near the North Bay Aqueduct pumps.

Key Issues:

- Because of the State program to increase tidal wetland habitat, the State has an obligation to help fund the Alternate Intake Project.
- SCWA believes the State should contribute half of the Project capital costs amounting to about \$200 million.



THE DELTA

SCWA has many interests in the Delta including: • The North Bay Aqueduct water diversion. • Flood management, including Delta levees. • Land use changes from the development of habitat projects. Major changes in the Delta are planned from the Bay Delta Conservation Plan and requirements of the State and Federal water projects to meet Endangered Species Act requirements. SCWA is not necessarily opposed to these efforts, but along with Solano County have raised issues that must be addressed

Kev Issues:

• Water quality and endangered species impacts to the North Bay Aqueduct must be addressed.

- A sustainable Delta levee funding program must be part of any Delta fix.
- Economic impacts of agricultural land conversion to habitat must be fully mitigated
- Flood management in the Delta must be a major part of any Delta fix.

SCWA is a founding member of the Lower Putah Creek Coordinating Committee and permanently funds most of the Committee's operating costs. Over the years the Committee has been very successful in obtaining millions of grant dollars, administered by SCWA, for restoration projects in Putah Creek and with the Putah Creek Council provides an effective community outreach program.

Key Issue:

• The LPCCC and SCWA support measures that provide funding sources for creek habitat restoration projects.



WATER CONSERVATION

SCWA continues an active urban water conservation project done in cooperation with cities and districts in Solano County. Many conservation and education programs are done countywide and some regionally.

In cooperation with three agricultural water districts SCWA meets the needs of the greater community.

Key Issue:

• Geography and local cost effectiveness are two key elements in Solano County management efficiency and water conservation.

HABITAT CONSERVATION PLAN



The HCP covers 36 species and will ultimately create approximately 25,000 acres of preserves for these species while allowing approximately 13,000 acres of future urban development.

SCWA is preparing a Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) for the protection of endangered species. The main focus of the HCP is to address endangered species impacts from city development projects and public agency operations and maintenance.

The HCP allows for local implementation of endangered species permitting and streamlines economic development projects. We are also coordinating the HCP with Corps of Engineers and Regional Water Quality Control Board wetlands permitting. Key Issue:

• The Delta Stewardship Council Delta Plan creates conflicts with local Delta HCP's by requiring local HCP actions to be subject to a Delta Plan consistency determination.

• SCWA works cooperatively with the Central Valley Flood Protection Plan and advocates for a sustainable program of funding needed for restoration and maintenance of Delta levees.



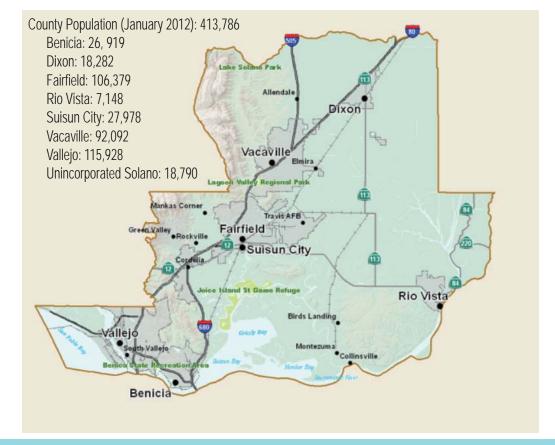

SCWA maintains the Ulatis Flood Control project in the east County and the Green Valley Flood Control Project in the Fairfield area. SCWA is also involved in flood management planning in the County. The eastern part of Solano County is protected by Delta levees.

SCWA is the State reporting entity (CASGEM Program) for Solano's groundwater resources. The public agency groundwater users operate their use of the groundwater basin sustainably in coordination with surface water.



FINANCES



Primarily by ad valorum property taxes, SCWA also receives additional funding from water charges and grants. Tax revenues and grants help keep wholesale water charges low to enable cities and districts to maintain affordable water rates. Prudently, SCWA has a series of dedicated reserves to fund future needed capital costs. Foreseeably large future expenses include refurbishment of the 50 year old Solano Project and the funding of the North Bay Aqueduct Alternate Intake Project. Key Issues:

- Protection of local property tax revenues is critical for a safe and affordable water supply in Solano County.
- SCWA reserves are dedicated towards the funding of specific critical infrastructure projects.

The Water Agency has several interests in this area of Sweeney Creek in addition to the general flood control planning interests. Sweeney Creek drains into the Sweeney Creek Unit of the Ulatis Flood Control Project that is maintained by the Water Agency. The area that floods is upstream of the Ulatis Project. Additionally, the Putah South Canal intersects Sweeney Creek in this area. The Canal changed local drainage patterns when the Canal was built (as did Interstate 505) and the Canal embankment acts as a constriction to moving flood waters through the area. The Putah South Canal releases water into Sweeney Creek for delivery to the Maine Prairie Water District.

As part of the Water Agency's Flood Control Planning Program, several comprehensive flood management watershed studies were completed for Sweeney Creek. The reports acknowledged that providing 100 year protection was not feasible in this area, in fact even providing 10 year protection was not feasible. In order to obtain higher levels of flood protection, Sweeney Creek would need to be widened or bypass channels constructed. These alternatives have extremely high costs and landowners were not receptive to granting of additional right-of-way necessary. The studies included a cost benefit analysis of these projects using the federal benchmark of a project having a cost to benefit ratio of 1.0 or greater. None of the previous projects met this cost benefit criteria except for a project involving raising of homes or berm construction in the area.

Home raising programs, or alternatively flood walls or berms, are common means of protecting structures from floods. They are particularly common in areas that are sparsely populated that could not financially support a major structural flood control project to reduce flooding. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has procedures as to how home raising programs should be evaluated. Our consultant used the FEMA procedures to analyze the Sweeney Creek home raising program.

The Board established maximum payout per home is \$25,000, consistent with the Board's cost sharing policy for flood control projects. We have several landowners currently considering the Program, however some are hesitant to expend funds for a project that they may not be able to afford. The Flood Control Advisory Committee feels that offering to cost share initial survey and design costs will be an incentive for more participation. The Committee recommends the Board modify the Program to allow up to \$5,000 of the Program limit of \$25,000 per home to be used for initial survey and design costs with a requirement of at least a 20% landowner cost share.

We have included \$25,000 in the current fiscal year budget for the Sweeney Creek Home Raising Program. There is adequate funding for this change in the Program. This change could lead to more applicants leading to the need to increase the budget in future years to accommodate more projects.
