- (D) <u>Purchase Order for new screens for the PSC Headworks Improvement Project:</u> Authorize General Manager to approve Purchase Order in the amount of \$57,800 for new screens for the Putah South Canal (PSC) Headworks Improvement Project.
- (E) <u>Emergency Declaration Putah South Canal Leak Repair:</u>
 - 1. Authorize staff to use emergency contracting procedures under the Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act for leak repairs on the Putah South Canal due to seepage damage. Find that the emergency will not permit a delay resulting from a competitive solicitation for bids, and that the action is

necessary to respond to the emergency (Note: pursuant to the Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act, a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Board is required). The rough estimate for the repair is \$75,000 to restore delivery capacity.

<u>GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT OF SOLANO SUB-BASIN PURSUANT TO</u> <u>SUSTAINABLE GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT ACT</u>

District Engineer Thomas Pate presented background information on the characteristics and use of the Solano Sub-basin (SSB) groundwater unit. The SSB is subject to compliance with the recently enacted Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) and specifically, SGMA's mandate t to create a Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA) and adopt a Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) for the SSB by July 2017 and 2022, respectively.

Staff requested authorization to convene regional and local discussions to identify potential SSB GSA governance structures and management activities pursuant to SGMA. The Board expressed concern that implementation may be getting ahead of policy decisions. Chairman Crossley referred the issue to the Water Policy Committee for further discussion and requested a recommendation be brought back to the Board in October for consideration.

- 2. Authorize General Manager to execute Amendment No. 1 with KC Engineering, increasing the total contract amount by \$25,000, from \$20,000 to \$45,000;
- 3. Authorize General Manager to execute Amendment No. 2 with Summers Engineering, Inc., increasing the total contract amount by \$60,000, from \$200,000 to \$260,000.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Funding is programmed and available in the current FY 2015-2016 Solano Project Rehabilitation and Betterment Program budget for these expenses.

BACKGROUND:

The Putah South Canal (PSC) Headworks Improvement Project is a major capital improvement project located at the Putah Diversion Dam facility. The project involves replacement of the intake screens and screen cleaning system, addresses geotechnical settlement issues, and provides electrical system upgrades. The Board previously awarded a \$1,199,215 construction contract to Anderson Pacific to implement the improvement plans. Construction is in progress.

The requested authority to issue change orders that collectively do not exceed 20 present for the total PSC Headworks Improvement Project construction cost will allow for the efficient processing and approval of change orders, which are a normal part of the construction process. During construction, site conditions are often different than expected, necessitating design or construction modifications. Expedited approval of change orders is often needed to prevent costly delays. Monthly reporting on use of this delegated authority will be provided to the Board in the General Manager's report.

The proposed contract amendment with KC Engineering will provide additional geotechnical support for the PSC Headworks Improvement Project. Since construction started on the PSC Headworks project, several geotechnical issues have arisen including significant embankment material changes to the new access road, poor foundation materials, and changes to the drilled pier locations that have required additional support. The proposed contract amendment provides the additional geotechnical support required to help resolve several of these issues as well as continued geotechnical support as required.

The proposed contract amendment with Summers Engineering, Inc. will provide additional engineering construction support for the PSC Headworks Improvement Project. As mentioned above, several geotechnical issues have arisen that have required input from the geotechnical engineer, resulting in several design changes. Site conditions have also required design changes to the concrete grade beams, storm drains, underlying foundation, and other important aspects of the project. The proposed contract amendment provides the additional engineering construction support required to help resolve several of these issues.

Groundwater

The Water Policy Committee met on September 14 and September 28 to discuss the process and protocols for developing a Groundwater Sustainability Agency for the Solano Sub-basin. The Committee is recommending the Board authorize Water Agency staff, under the direction of the SCWA Board of Directors Water Policy Committee, to provide administrative services in support of Groundwater Sustainability Agency formation, and that Water Agency staff be authorized to retain, through the Department of Water Resources, Ag Innovations for meeting facilitation services. The Committee will be meeting on November 2 to discuss the pros and cons of adjusting the Solano Sub-basin boundaries , appropriate Guiding Principles for formation of the GSA, and anticipated project costs, with the expectation that Committee recommendations for these latter three items will be presented at the November 12, 2015 Board meeting.

PSC Headworks Improvement Project

Work on the Putah South Canal Headworks Improvement Project continues and has not been without challenges. Subtle discrepancies between the original "As-Built" drawings and what is actually present at the site are necessitating engineering design revisions, which is in turn delaying project completion. Staff and the contractors are scrambling to complete the project ahead of the rainy season. The October Board agenda includes two contract amendments and a request to authorize the General Manager to approve Change Orders that collectively do not exceed 20 percent of the original contracted construction cost. Currently, the General Manager has the authority to authorize individual change orders that do not exceed \$50,000.

The 1.2 million dollar PSC Headworks Improvement Project is the largest single capital improvement project initiated by SCWA to date. While the current Board-granted authority regarding change orders works well with smaller projects, staff has found that it does not provide the desired contractual flexibility with respect to very large projects, such as the PSC Headworks Improvement Project. A project in which a \$60,000 change order - in this case a change order

that would constitute just a 5 percent increase in the total contracted construction cost - is not necessarily uncommon. Staff is requesting the additional change order authority in order to minimize the chances of any further PSC Headworks Improvement Project delays, and if viewed favorably by the Board, will be recommending incorporation of the "20 percent" change order authority for large projects, into the Agency's Change Order authorization policy.

Putah South Canal Leak Repair

Last month the Board authorized staff to use emergency contracting procedures under the Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act to repair damaged concrete panels and prevent further leakage from the Putah South Canal, near the Terminal Check. An initial "fix" has been completed and six monitoring wells installed to characterize shallow groundwater conditions in the vicinity of the damaged panels, and the occurrence of any additional leakage.

Lake County Fires

Within the last 12 months roughly 1/3 of the Lake Berryessa Watershed has burned, increasing the potential for widespread accelerated soil erosion and more recently, as a result of the Valley Fire, the potential for other water borne contaminants via storm runoff from burned homes and other structures. Over 1,500 structures were destroyed in the Valley Fire, most of which were located in the upper watershed, in and around Middletown. Staff is investigating the probable water quality threats to the Solano Project water supply and what if any practical options exist to moderate the water quality impacts of the Lake County fires.

Board Education

One of the reoccurring themes I have heard as I conduct my one-on-one "meet and greet" meetings with Board members (I have met with seven of you to date) is a desire to receive more information regarding water issues and the activities of the Water Agency. As a starting point, staff is proposing to schedule periodic informational workshops at which specific topics – such as water conservation, Solano project carryover management, groundwater management - would be discussed. These workshops would be noticed in accordance with the Brown Act, ideally kept informal, and for the most part informational/technical in nature – Staff, Board members and anyone from the public would be invited to attend. Let me know if you have any thoughts or recommendations regarding workshop topics meeting logistics.

While on the topic of education, attached is a flyer for the December 1-4, 2015 Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) Fall Conference in Indian Wells. These conferences are typically attended by technical staff and policy makers, and provide a good forum for the discussion of contemporary water management issues, as well as an opportunity to network with peers. Let me know if you would like to attend and we will submit registration on your behalf.

Legislative Committee/Legislative Platform

With 2016 rapidly approaching, it is time for the Water Agency Board's Legislative Committee to convene and discuss the State and Federal legislative program and policy guidelines we wish to put forth in 2016, the desired level of legislative advocacy effort, alignment and coordination with County and City legislative advocacy efforts, and how best to articulate the information to our State and Federal legislators. Patrick Leathers, the Water Agency's Legislative Advocate, is available to help with this effort.

The Blob, which is a giant pool of warm water off the West Coast has been blocking storms from reaching California over the past few years.

How Does the Public Trust Doctrine Apply to Groundwater in California, or Does It?

Does the public trust doctrine apply to groundwater extractions? What is the connection between groundwater extraction and surface water flows and who's responsibility is it to evaluate that connection, the courts or regulatory bodies? In the case of Environmental Law Foundation v. State Water Resources Control Board, Siskiyou County, a superior court determined that the public trust doctrine may apply to groundwater extractions, but that decision is on appeal. In the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act, the Legislature requires groundwater management agencies to develop groundwater management plans that, among other things, avoid depletions of interconnected surface water that have significant and unreasonable adverse impacts on beneficial uses of surface water. The panel will discuss the public trust doctrine in the context of groundwater rights and regulation in California, the implications of judicially created doctrine, and the impacts of legislation such as SGMA.

Pricing Water in a Time of Drought

As the drought continues to impact water users throughout the state, water providers that have imposed tiered rates may wonder if those rates can survive legal challenges in light of the recent Prop. 218 case Capistrano Taxpayers Association, Inc. v. This presentation will address recent court guidance regarding the propriety and risks (or lack thereof) of using tiered rates under Proposition 218 and the consequences of having tiered rates that do not meet Prop. 218's requirements, how tiered rates might be validated and thus shielded from litigation, and alternatives to tiered rates that may avoid conflicts with Prop. 218.

SUBJECT: Lake Berryessa Outreach Video & Presentation

RECOMMENDATION:

Watch video and presentation on the 2015 Lake Berryessa Outreach Program on invasive species and water quality education.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

No financial impact. Funding has already been approved and programmed in the FY 2015-2016 Solano Project budget. The total budget is \$254,020 with \$128,325 from a Boating & Waterways Grant, \$31,940 from in-kind staff time (multiple agencies), and \$93,755 directly funded by the Water Agency.

BACKGROUND:

The Lake Berryessa Outreach Program consists of water quality education and invasive species screening to boaters and recreators at Lake Berryessa. The purpose of the program is to protect Lake Berryessa water quality and prevent the spread of invasive species. Lake Berryessa is a critical part of the Solano Project, storing and providing municipal and irrigation water for use in Solano County. Invasive species such as zebra and quagga mussels could significantly impact Solano Project infrastructure, dramatically increasing Operation and Maintenance Costs. The goal of the Lake Berryessa Outreach Program is to educate boaters and recreators on good boating and recreating practices and to prevent the spread of zebra and quagga mussels.

Several Lake Berryessa Outreach Interns will be presenting a summary of the 2015 outreach efforts. The program was expanded in 2015 from 6.5 to 11 interns as part of a Division of Boating & Waterways Grant. A short video will also be shown, highlighting the 2015 summer outreach efforts.

SUBJECT: Groundwater Management of Solano Sub-basin pursuant to Sustainable Groundwater Management Act

RECOMMENDATION:

- 1) Authorize SCWA staff, under the direction of the SCWA Board of Directors Water Policy Committee, to provide administrative services in support of Groundwater Sustainability Agency formation; and
- 2) Authorize SCWA staff to retain, through the Department of Water Resources, Ag Innovations for meeting facilitation services.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Staff time will be required to schedule and coordinate meetings. Additional costs – approximately \$10,000 - for mailings, document preparation and copying, and to procure venues for stakeholder meetings may also be required. There is adequate funding in the approved FY 15-16 budget to accommodate the anticipated costs for these activities. As discussed below, the Department of Water Resources is offering the services of Ag Innovations at no cost to SCWA or any other participants involved with the formation of the Solano Sub-basin.

BACKGROUND:

Formation of the Solano Sub-basin GSA could easily take a year to complete. Numerous stakeholder meetings, mailings, and related public outreach efforts will be required, and in turn, administrative services to support the efforts leading up to GSA formation. The Water Policy Committee recommends Water Agency staff provide, under the direction of the Water Policy Committee, the administrative services necessary to accomplish GSA formation.

In addition to administrative support, it is anticipated the GSA formation process will require professional meeting facilitation services. The Department of Water Resources (DWR) is willing to provide complimentary facilitation services – up to approximately 300 hours - via one of two private sector firms; MWH or Ag Innovations, to qualifying entities. Due in part to Ag Innovations stronger connection with the agricultural community and the fact that the agricultural community is the predominant groundwater user in the Solano Sub-basin, the Water Policy Committee recommends Ag Innovations be retained to assist with GSA formation, and that Water Agency staff serve as the administrative point of contact with Ag Innovations.
