### **BOARD MEMBER REPORTS**

Mayor Vick commented on the film "Over Troubled Waters" presented by Restore the Delta which tells a broad informative story of the Delta. The film is well crafted and reminds viewers of the value of the Delta.

#### GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

There were no additions to the General Manager's written report.

#### PUTAH CREEK RESTORATION PROJECT

Manager Okita reported on a new project, the "Lower Putah Creek Restoration from the Toe Drain to Putah Diversion Dam: Project Description Development, CEQA Compliance, Permits, Selected Final Design". There are two parts to this project. One part would create a new channel in the Yolo Bypass that would connect the Yolo Bypass with lower Putah Creek and provide a pathway for salmon and steelhead to enter Putah Creek. The second part of the project includes planning and permitting for restoration projects from the Yolo Bypass to the Putah Diversion Dam.

The Yolo Bypass project would provide the CEQA documents, permitting, plans and specifications. The portion of the project from the Bypass to the Putah Diversion Dam provides environmental documentation and permitting for creek restoration projects which will also provide a benefit to obtain grant funding for these projects. The Lower Putah Creek Coordinating Committee is the planning lead for the portion of the project from the Bypass to the Putah Diversion Dam. The Yolo Basin Foundation will be the planning lead for the portion of the project from the Yolo Bypass to the Toe Drain.

The Agency will be participating in the entire project. The Agency has concern that more salmon and steelhead in the Creek could create risk for the Solano Project because it is possible that there would be a request for more water releases. The Agency would like to get assurances to protect against these risks for the Solano Project.

On a motion by Mayor Patterson and a second by Mayor Hardy the Board unanimously approved staff to participate on the Project Team for the "Lower Putah Creek Restoration from the Toe Drain to Putah Diversion Dam: Project Description Development, CEQA Compliance, Permits, Selected Final Design".

September General Manager's Report

The Legislature is ending its session and there are two bills that we are watching for the Governor's signature. AB 2443 would provide funding for invasive mussel programs. The Board supported this bill. A potential program for Lake Berryessa will be discussed at this Board meeting. A second bill of local importance is SB 1278 by Senator Wolk. This bill provides some important clarification to existing State law regarding flood management in the Central Valley. Amendments to the bill on August 20 added a key clarification that the new 200-year protection standard does not apply to impacts from local drainage, only to those areas protected from a leveed riverine system. This clarifies that Vacaville and Dixon are not subject to this new requirement. Since the law only applies to the Central Valley, Fairfield, Benicia, Suisun City and Vallejo were never subject to this law. Although the Board did not take a specific position on SB 1278, based on existing Board policy, I directed our lobbyist to show SCWA support. We may know by the Board meeting if the Governor has signed these two bills.

Dear City County Coordinating Council Members:

On August 14, 2012 the Solano County Board of Supervisors approved a document entitled 'Delta Water Planning Process, Solano County, Principles/Assurances' (Principles/Assurances document). That document is attached. It represents a compilation and consolidation of past and present County policies and positions related to Delta water issues. It will provide the foundation and guidance for Solano County going forward in responding to the many plans, programs and projects being contemplated by the State and Federal government now and in the future that have the potential to affect the County.

As part of our action, the Board of Supervisors requested that the Principles/Assurances document be forwarded to the City County Coordinating Council (CCCC), all cities in the County, the Solano County Water Agency, the Reclamation and Water Districts, and ask that each agency consider adopting this document. The intent of the Board's action was to keep our partner agencies in the County up to date on issues the County is currently addressing relative to the State and Federal water proposals and to develop a unified position on these matters. As follow up, County staff will provide a briefing on Delta water issues to the CCCC at an upcoming meeting. Several of the large scale Federal and State water proposals are entering critical phases and it is becoming increasingly important for all entities in the County to be informed and ready to respond to these proposals as the potential impacts could be detrimental to the entire region.

In addition to the Principles/Assurances document, also attached is the Delta Counties Coalition (DCC) Resolution on Water and Delta Related Issues, which is incorporated by reference in the attached County Principles/Assurances document. The DCC Resolution contains 12 Principles which are key and foundational to any position on Delta issues. The DCC includes Solano, Yolo, San Joaquin, Sacramento and Contra Costa Counties. The collaboration of the five counties has been pivotal in increasing awareness of how the Delta region will be affected by various Delta water project proposals.

We hope these documents are helpful in providing perspective on the County's position on Delta water issues and look forward to further discussion during our CCCC meeting. Please let us know if further discussion with your respective jurisdiction would be useful. County staff would be available to present to your governing body as appropriate.

# Principles/Assurances

# **General Principles**

Meaningful decision-making role in Delta planning process and governance: The Delta counties including Solano County have had no role (other than as outside commentator) in the processes to date. Key Delta decisions are still controlled by the water contractors and related State/Federal agencies. Local agencies and other directly impacted entities need a key decision-making role. Specifically;

- <u>Full collaboration with the County from inception on planning, programs or projects</u>
   occurring within the County, including studies to accomplish common understanding
   among all parties and sufficient detail to plan successfully for change.
- Respect local land use authority; close coordination with locals: Historically, and to the
  current day, Solano County has developed and implemented highly effective policies for
  agricultural land preservation and environmental stewardship. Solano County believes
  the state and federal government should respect Solano County's General Plan and
  work with the County in regards to Delta Plans and projects currently under
  consideration.

Strive for net benefit / No harm to Solano County: A commitment to net benefit to Solano County, rather than simply trying to avoid harm. Other regions in the State will clearly benefit from improved water reliability, water quality and supply from the projects being contemplated. Solano County should not receive harm as a result. We should expect a goal of net benefit in areas including (not limited to) water quality, flood management, agricultural production, economic prosperity and environmental quality. This would include;

- Identification of impacts. Detailed and appropriate identification of the broad array of
  interrelated impacts of a proposed action. Solano County will require oversight of a suite
  of detailed studies of impacted areas to ensure all impacts (as well as secondary
  impacts) are identified and mitigated over the long term.
- <u>Full and comprehensive mitigation of impacts.</u> There should be clear and unequivocal provisions in key state/federal Delta planning documents for a complete and detailed review of impacts on Solano and other counties covered by the BDCP. This shall include related projects and a clear commitment for full mitigation for the range of impacts identified. This includes a commitment of financial resources and revenue streams to ensure impacts are mitigated in both the short and long term.

### Delta Plan, BDCP process and timing:

- <u>Defer approval of the Delta Plan</u> until a full range of information is available to allow for thoughtful and informed decision making, including necessary detail related to BDCP (an Interim Plan is in place).
- <u>BDCP: public process</u>; BDCP should follow a transparent, public, scientifically-based process, with science driving the process and results rather than political will. Each Plan should inform and complete the other.

Reduce reliance on Delta exports: The BDCP and Delta Plan should require proof of south-of-Delta planning for regional self-sufficiency over time as a measurable performance goal by those exporting water from the Delta. This should be inherent in any plan or program contemplating water supply or quality export, thereby reducing reliance on the Delta consistent with applicable law.

<u>Implement early actions immediately</u>, (including levee repair and rehabilitation, fish screens, agricultural intake screens, etc.) as a good-faith effort to restore the Delta and respect Delta as a Place.

<u>DCC Principles:</u> This document incorporates by reference the Delta Counties Coalition 12 Principles (Solano County Resolution 2008-150 and Resolution 2010-78)

# **Assurances**

# Water Quality, Supply

- Water quality shall be protected and improved.
- <u>Establishment of flow standards for a healthy Delta</u>: Scientifically-based, proven, enforceable flow standards to ensure a healthy Delta must be established prior to any major changes to points of diversion and/or changes in exports.
- <u>Provisions of the North Delta Water Agreement</u>, including water quality, flow protection shall be retained and respected.
- Water quality in the Suisun Marsh shall not be degraded from current legally mandated levels identified in the Suisun Marsh Preservation Agreement (and including subsequent protections). Water quality standards and adequate flows must be retained.
- Area of origin and other senior, appropriative and riparian water rights in Solano County shall be protected and preserved.
- North Bay Aqueduct Alternate Intake Project: Support state and/or federal funding for the NBA Alternate Intake Project. Moving this drinking water diversion point would provide environmental benefits and improve water quality and reliability for Solano water users.

# **Ecosystem**

- <u>Public lands: land conversion;</u> public lands should be utilized first for the purposes of land conversion for ecosystem purposes. Active management of public lands is required (absentee landowner creates additional impacts to County).
- Acquisitions: willing seller; acquisitions for the purposes of ecosystem restoration should be on a willing-seller basis where practicable and shall not adversely affect other agricultural areas in the vicinity.
- Acquisition or purchase of land: notification; In Solano County, acquisition of land
  destined for change in use must be reported to the County immediately. County permits
  are required for conversion of agricultural lands.
- <u>ESA take protection</u> shall be provided to Solano County farm and municipal operations
  that might otherwise be adversely affected by proximity to new habitat restoration
  projects and introduction of endangered species associated with these projects (Safe
  Harbor agreement).
- <u>Habitat restoration planning, implementation</u>: habitat restoration planning must be accomplished in close collaboration with the County, consistent with Solano County Water Agency Habitat Conservation Plan/Natural Communities Conservation Plan and in accordance with studies done in collaboration with the County. Ecosystem restoration is exceedingly difficult to accomplish and has a correspondingly low rate of success. As a result, a phased approach and detailed alternative plan is critical to any implementation strategy. Adaptive management, although a critical component of any plan, is not a sufficient alternative strategy, nor should it be justification for moving forward with ill-conceived plans. Long term management of these lands is also required to be in the Plan.
- <u>Protection of Suisun Marsh</u>: any contemplated actions to Suisun Marsh need to be consistent with the Suisun Marsh Preservation Act and the Suisun Marsh Habitat Management, Preservation and Restoration Plan. Impacts need to be clearly identified, and mitigated, striving for net benefit.

# **Local Land Use Authority: collaboration**

- <u>Local land use authority must be respected</u>: any state/federal plans with potential to conflict with the County General Plan must be accomplished in close collaboration with the County.
- <u>Full transparency and local inclusion</u> in state/federal Delta water planning efforts. No studies shall occur in or on lands adjacent to or in the County without the County being notified and a funded, active participant in such efforts from their inception. This includes at a minimum, studies in the Bypass area in geographically and hydrologically-linked Yolo County, and in Suisun Marsh.

# Agriculture

- Preservation of agriculture: agriculture with prime or actively farmed lands with senior area-of-origin water rights shall not be sacrificed for agriculture where junior water rights prevail, especially in areas experiencing soil contamination problems and which are unsustainable over time.
- <u>Existing farmland preservation</u>: agriculture preservation policies must be foundational to any planning for conversion done for the region: agriculture and its associated economy must be protected, made whole at minimum, and improved if possible.
- Conversion of prime or actively farmed lands for habitat restoration shall not occur
  without concurrence from the County and mitigation agreements in conjunction with a
  state/federal/local collaborative planning process.
- Ag conservation/reclamation: recycling (reuse) and other irrigation efficiencies/practices should be included in any plan or program contemplating the export of Delta water as a measurable performance goal over a prescribed period of time.

### Flood Control/Levees

- The County's flood control and levee system shall not be compromised and in fact should benefit from habitat restoration and flood control projects that may be initiated in conjunction with various Delta planning efforts. Flood protection for Rio Vista should be improved.
- Continue the Existing Levee Subvention Program at 75%.
- Stipulate PL 84-99 as the appropriate minimum levee standard.
- Commit to protection of Ryer Island from habitat restoration or conveyance projects including secondary effects from such projects including limitations on access, or stresses on the islands protective levees from nearby flood control or habitat projects.
- Commit to protection of lands south of the Bypass, including Rio\_Vista from changes to
  the Bypass and land conversion to ecosystem restoration by ensuring levee
  rehabilitation to the PL-84-99 standard at a minimum and other flood infrastructure as
  appropriate.
- Fund and restart the Delta Long-Term Management Strategy (DLTMS), a process to
  ensure dredging and beneficial reuse of dredged material for levee repair, as is done in
  the Bay Area.

# **Projects: Financing**

- Obtain funding to conduct independent scientific and other studies to review data, modeling and determine extent of impacts from the range of contemplated projects with potential to affect change in Solano County.
- <u>Secure financial support for infrastructure needs</u> (including but not limited to) transportation corridors, levees/flood control/storage, water delivery systems and improved emergency response, including rock stockpiles specifically for levee repair.
- Require mitigation for lost tax revenues, public health and safety, and other impacts.

# Areas requiring study (not exhaustive)

The state and federal government should make funds available for county-specific studies of potential impacts of contemplative plans, policies and projects. These funds should be provided with 'no strings attached' relative to the County. The studies should consider the full range of impacts and provide for full collaboration at all levels. The list below is a baseline and will likely grow over time as more information becomes available.

- Cache Slough Complex (phased approach): includes baseline land use/economic study: detailed economic work (secondary impacts, regional considerations); infrastructure; flood control; ecosystem restoration
- Flow; altered hydrology: county-wide
- Water quality change: county-wide
- Ecosystem Restoration Suisun Marsh (in concert with approved Plans as described under Ecosystem section)
- Levee restoration Cache Slough Complex, downstream; east county region
- Levee restoration, maintenance, dredging Suisun Marsh

# RESOLUTION NO. 2010-78

# DELTA COUNTIES COALITION RESOLUTION ON WATER AND DELTA RELATED ISSUES

This Resolution is effective upon passage by the COUNTIES OF CONTRA COSTA, SACRAMENTO, SAN JOAQUIN, SOLANO AND YOLO, political subdivisions of the State of California (hereinafter collectively referred to as "the COUNTIES").

### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta is at risk from many factors, and in addressing these threats the state may make large-scale changes to the Delta's legal boundaries and ecosystem, land use authority within the Delta, water conveyance through and around the Delta, water rights and water management statewide and many other aspects related to the Delta; and

WHEREAS, the COUNTIES of Contra Costa, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Solano and Yolo believe there is value in developing a coalition on issues concerning the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta and greater Bay/Delta Estuary; and

WHEREAS, the COUNTIES wish to collectively articulate the issues and interests from the perspective of the Delta region itself, from the people who call the Delta home and perhaps best understand the tremendous resource the Delta represents; and

WHEREAS, the COUNTIES have identified a need for joint action and advocacy in areas of mutual interest on Delta related issues; and

WHEREAS, the COUNTIES wish to educate and maintain positive working relationships with regional, state and federal governmental agencies and the public on Delta related issues; and

WHEREAS, through this Resolution, the COUNTIES have adopted a statement of basic principles describing their joint interests, which may be refined over time.

### NOW THEREFORE, the COUNTIES agree that:

The COUNTIES adopt this Resolution for the purpose of articulating mutual interests on Delta issues. The COUNTIES resolve to work together to better understand Delta related issues from a regional perspective and to use their unified voice to advocate on behalf of local government in available forums at the federal and state levels. Our mutual interests are as follows.

# Management of the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta and greater Bay/Delta Estuary must:

- Protect and improve water quality and water quantity in the Delta region and maintain appropriate Delta outflow for a healthy estuary;
- 2. Protect the existing water right priority system and legislative protections established for the Delta;
- Respect and safeguard Delta Counties' responsibilities related to land use, water resources, flood management, tax revenues, public health and safety, economic development, agricultural stability, recreation, and environmental protection in any new Delta governance structures;
- 4. Represent and include local government in any new governance structures for the Delta;

- 5. Protect the economic viability of agriculture and the ongoing vitality of communities in the Delta;
- 6. Support rehabilitation, improvement and maintenance of levees throughout the Delta:
- Support the Delta pool concept; in which the common resource provides quality freshwater supply to all delta users, requiring mutual responsibility to maintain, restore and protect the common resource;
- 8. Support immediate improvements to through-Delta conveyance;
- 9. Require that any water conveyance plan for the Delta be aligned with the principles established by this resolution and supported by clearly demonstrated improvement to the entire state's water management;
- 10. Protect and restore the Delta ecosystem, including adequate water supply and quality to support it in perpetuity;
- 11. Include the study of storage options and implementation of conservation, recycling, re-use, and regional self sufficiency as part of a state-wide improved flood management and water supply system; and
- 12. Support those conservation actions that are aligned with the principles established by this resolution and that are in accordance with habitat plans and programs of the Delta Counties.

The following is a listing of Delta issues and concerns of Solano County and the Solano County Water Agency grouped as follows:

<u>Bay Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP) Technical</u> – these are matters that are expected to be included in the BDCP text or BDCP EIR/EIS text. These are routine items that we need to check that they are included, and adequately addressed, in future documents.

<u>BDCP Mitigations to be Negotiated</u> – items needing negotiation with BDCP advocates to get into BDPC text and/or BDCP Implementing Agreement

8,000 acres Biological Opinion – items needing negotiation with DWR and water contractors having to do with the requirement for 8,000 acres of tidal marsh habitat in Solano and Yolo counties independent of BDCP. These items are a subset of BDCP Technical and negotiated items

The intent of these groupings is to identify which Solano issues need to be addressed in the context of a complete Delta package that will likely include BDCP. Since these issues are wide ranging, it will be necessary to negotiate matters in different forums as opportunities arise. BDCP has not yet developed details of its plan or its funding plan. There are Delta issues outside of BDCP that need to be addressed as part of a comprehensive Delta package such a Delta levees and governance. These are likely to be addressed in legislation. Funding issues will likely be included in both BDCP and legislation.

The lists are developed to be concise statements of Solano issues and are not intended to include detailed justifications or specific language to be included in documents or legislation.

There may be opportunities to acquire funding for projects of local benefit as Delta issues are discussed and negotiated. Many have been suggested during various Delta discussions, but have not been included in this paper, but have been documented in other papers.

This document is intended for public distribution. Items are expected to be added or subtracted over time. Solano negotiators will develop negotiation positions on matters to be negotiated to guide negotiations and will keep our elected officials informed as to the status of negotiations.

### **BDCP Technical**

- Ongoing Management Funding require habitat projects to identify a secure and sufficient funding source to pay for the ongoing management of the project in perpetuity, including, but not limited to issues involving mosquitoes, invasive species, .agricultural pests and other vectors
- Willing Sellers Eminent domain not allowed for habitat projects in the Delta and Suisun Marsh.
- Adaptive Management for Human Health & Safety, Economic impacts and Other Unintended Impacts— the Adaptive Management Plan to include modification of a habitat restoration, water operation, or conveyance infrastructure project in the Delta if it is causing negative impacts to human health and safety (e.g.: reduced water quality in the Delta, increase in mosquito disease due to stagnant marshes, reduced flood capacity due to unmanaged vegetation growth, increased risk to levees stability from erosion and seepage, etc.). Adaptive management must also be invoked if measures cause unanticipated negative local impacts, including but not limited to economic impacts.
- <u>Delta Water Quality</u> require compliance with NDWA 1981 Agreement water quality criteria.
   Assure adequate water quality in Delta channels for agricultural, municipal and other uses in the Delta.
- <u>Suisun Marsh Water Quality</u> Assure adequate water quality (salinity) to protect beneficial use, existing wetland habitat conditions and quality consistent with the Suisun Marsh Plan.
- Impacts to Existing Agriculture No changes to water quality and water supply that adversely affect
  Delta agriculture. Actions must not restrict crop selection or require extraordinary saltmanagement, irrigation or drainage practices. Channel water levels must not change so as to impact
  availability of water supply.
- <u>Flood Protection Priority</u> no increased flood risks by increasing flood stages or reducing flood capacity anywhere in Delta channels and bypass system. No preemption of the paramount public safety function of the flood protection components of the Sacramento and San Joaquin River Flood Control Project systems.
- General Plans Consistency with Solano County and Rio Vista General Plans
- <u>Levees BDCP</u> projects, infrastructure and habitat, must not have adverse impacts to levees or levee maintenance. Erosion and seepage through levees or wetlands into islands or adjacent lands should be identified specifically as items to be mitigated if caused by projects.
- <u>Suisun Marsh</u> Consistency with the Suisun Marsh Plan.
- <u>Endangered Species Impacts to Adjacent Lands-</u>require "Good Neighbor Policy" in BDCP as typically included in HCP's. Provide a process to offer Safe Harbor Agreements on a voluntary basis. Habitat projects must be designed and managed to internally self mitigate impacts to adjacent lands.

### **BDCP Mitigations to be Negotiated**

- <u>Mitigation Package for habitat/infrastructure land conversions –</u> For every habitat or infrastructure project the following items must be addressed and if adverse impacts are identified, fully mitigated. If the measure requires a payment a funding source must be identified that is not subject to voter approval or legislative appropriation.
  - Third party economic impacts the IMPLAN economic model, or an equivalent model, shall be used to determine a one- time payment to mitigate these impacts for the property being considered. This analysis shall be done for every project whether the property remains in private ownership or not. The analysis will compare the change in economic impacts from the pre-mitigation land use to use as a mitigation land. If there is a negative impact, the present worth of the negative impact shall be paid to the County.
  - Local Taxes and Assessments pay in-lieu local taxes, assessments and local government fees for any property subject to such charges in perpetuity in the same manner as property held by private interests.
  - If lands have a public use component, an analysis must be done to determine if there are increased costs to local governments for matters such as law enforcement, emergency response and road maintenance.
  - o If lands are taken out of agricultural production, other agricultural lands in Solano County must be permanently preserved at a1.5:1 ratio as per County policy.

Okita General Manager & Secretary to the Solano County Water Agency Development and implementation of a mussel detection and prevention plan is important to protect Lake Berryessa and Solano Project facilities from infestation of quagga and zebra mussels. The costs of cleaning and replacing infested facilities, as well as the potential effects to recreation and personal watercraft can be very large.

Staff recommends the Board to authorize staff to develop a mussel prevention program if state funding becomes available. Because SCWA lacks enforcement jurisdiction at lake Berryessa, any program would need to be coordinated with Napa County and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. Staff will bring back to the Board a program recommendation at a later date.
