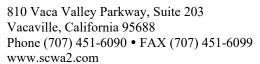

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chair Kott at 6:31 pm.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

On a motion by Mayor Rowlett and a second by Supervisor Vasquez the Board unanimously approved – by roll call vote - the agenda.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There were no public comments.

EXECUTION OF OFFICERS

On a motion by Supervisor Vasquez and a second by Mayor Price the Board unanimously elected – by roll call vote - Director Crossley Board of Directors Chair for 2021. On a Motion by Supervisor Vasquez and a Second by Supervisor Mashburn the Board unanimously elected – by roll call vote - Supervisor Spering Board of Directors Vice Chair for 2021.

Chair Crossley welcomed new members to the Board of Directors: Mayor Young of Benicia, Mayor Bird of Dixon, Supervisor Mashburn, and Mayor McConnell from Vallejo and appointed the following Board members to the 2021 Executive Committee:

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

There were no Board Member reports.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

The General Manager reported the passing of the Agency's longtime legislative advocate Pat Leathers. Supervisor Spering asked that the Board meeting be adjourned in the memory of Patrick Leathers and that the Agency send his family flowers and a certificate with the Board's sentiments.

SOLANO WATER ADVISORY COMMISSION

There was no report, the Solano Water Advisory Commission did not meet since the December Board meeting.

<u>APPOINTMENT OF LEGISLATIVE AND WATER POLICY COMMITTEES FOR 2021</u>

Chair Crossley appointed Board members to the Legislative and Water Policy Committees:

APPOINTMENT OF WORKFORCE STUDY COMMITTEE MEMBER

Chair Crossley noted that in 2020 he and Mayor Patterson were appointed by the Board Chair to the Workforce Study Committee, a committee consisting of Board members and staff that oversees the ongoing workforce study by Boucher Law – an analysis of the Water Agency's organizational structure, job classifications and job descriptions, and employee compensation. He explained that because Mayor Patterson did not run for re-election in 2020 and is no longer a member of the Water Agency Board of Directors, her seat on the Workforce Study Committee was now vacant. After brief discussion, Supervisor Brown was selected by the Board to replace Mayor Patterson on the Workforce Study Committee.

STATE WATER PROJECT CONTRACT AMENDMENT 22

General Manager Roland Sanford gave a lengthy presentation to the Board in which he discussed the contractual relationships between the Water Agency, Department of Water Resources (DWR), and the cities of Benicia, Fairfield, Suisun City, Vacaville and Vallejo for the North Bay Aqueduct water supply; the need for and purpose of Amendment 22 (aka Water Management Tools); and the environmental review process performed by DWR in support of Amendment 22. Mr. Sanford explained that the primary purpose of Amendment 22 is to facilitate the exchange or transfer of State Water Project water supplies between those agencies that contract with DWR for water from the State Water Project.

Mr. Sanford described how the North Bay Aqueduct water supply has become increasingly unreliable over the last 10 years, with annual water supply allocations ranging from 5 to 100 percent of what was originally anticipated when the Water Agency first contracted with DWR for the North Bay Aqueduct water supply. He noted that the highly variable annual water supply allocations, coupled with the need for water managers to assume worse-case conditions with regard to water availability, and inadequate storage capacity has at times resulted in purchased water going unused – most notably in the few years when full or nearly full water supply allocations have occurred. Mr. Sanford reported that over the last five years the North Bay Aqueduct water users in Solano County have collectively paid for nearly 50,000 acre-feet of water that was ultimately never used and explained that the water exchange and transfer provisions of Amendment 22 provided a mechanism for recuperating what would otherwise be a lost asset – unused but purchased water.

Mr. Sanford referenced the preliminary draft water exchange/transfer policy the SCWA Water Policy Committee has worked on over the last year and its relationship to Amendment 22. He discussed the need to complete, and for the Board to adopt a water exchange/transfer policy, and recommended the Board proceed with the approval of Amendment 22 with that understanding that in the absence of any adopted water exchange/transfer policy, all out-of-county exchanges or transfers proposed pursuant to Amendment 22 be reviewed and approved by the Water Agency Board on a case-by-case basis.

Mr. Sanford concluded his presentation with a discussion of DWR's environmental review of the proposed Water Management Tools set forth in Amendment 22, noting that DWR's environmental review was "programmatic" and did not analyze any specific proposed water exchange or transfer. He explained that any environmental review of a specific water exchange or transfer made pursuant the Water Management Tools would be the responsibility of the parties to the transaction, and that because the environmental review of any specific water exchange or transfer would be overseen by the parties to the transaction rather than DWR, it was impossible for DWR to conclude that none of the exchanges or transfers proposed pursuant to the Water Management Tools would result in significant adverse impacts. Mr. Sanford explained that in view of the aforementioned, DWR concluded in their environmental review of the proposed Water Management Tools that adverse impacts to groundwater were within the realm of possibility, but that the potential benefits of the Water Management Tools outweighed the potentially significant adverse impacts, and therefore as a part of their CEQA findings for the Water Management Tools, adopted a Statement of Overriding Conditions.

Following Mr. Sanford's presentation, Board members commented on the need to reinitiate the Water Policy Committee meetings and resume work on a water exchange/transfer policy. Mayor McConnell asked what impact if any, Amendment 22 would have on the City of Vallejo's water rights. Mr. Sanford and Water Agency Counsel Jeanne Zolezzi explained that Amendment 22 pertains exclusively to the State Water Project water supply.

On a motion by Supervisor Vasquez and a second by Mayor Wilson the Board unanimously approved – by roll call vote:

- 1. To make findings and statements of overriding considerations as a responsible agency under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) for the Final Environmental Impact Report for the State Water Project Supply Contract Amendment for Water Management, by adopting the CEQA Findings of Fact and Statement of Overriding Consideration for the State Water Project Supply Contract Amendments for Water Management prepared by the Department of Water Resources as the Agency's own; and
- 2. Authorized the General Manager to execute Amendment 22 to the Water Agency's Long Term Water Supply Contract with the Department of Water Resources to supplement and clarify water management tools regarding transfers and exchanges of the State Water Project water.

SACKETT RANCH PARTNERSHIP WITH SOLANO COUNTY

General Manager Roland Sanford summarized the events that lead to the Water Agency's purchase of the Sackett Ranch property and identified three potential Water Agency-County partnership options for ownership and management of Sackett Ranch property; (1) Proceed with joint title to the property and then jointly develop an operations and management plan for the property, (2) Jointly develop an operations and management plan prior to conveying joint title, and (3) splitting the property, with one parcel owned solely by the County and the other parcel solely owned by the Water Agency.

The Board discussed the three options and concluded that splitting the property into two separately owned parcels appears to be the best option. Supervisor Spering and Vasquez stated that the County was not comfortable with the current lease agreements associated with the property, and stated that the parcel split should occur in a manner that minimizes if not eliminates the County's involvement with the current leasing arrangements.

On a motion by Supervisor Spering and a second by Mayor Wilson the Board unanimously directed – by roll call vote – Water Agency staff to work with County staff to formulate a proposal for a 50-50 split of the Sackett Ranch property, to be reviewed by the Water Agency Board's Executive Committee prior to possible Board approval at the March Board meeting

DATE: February 11, 2021 Lower Putah Creek Chinook Salmon Spawning Habitat Project **SUBJECT: RECOMMENDATIONS:** Approve Resolution 2021-01 authorizing General Manager to enter into agreements for receipt of a \$750,000 grant from California Resources Agency for the Lower Putah Creek Chinook Salmon Spawning Habitat Project. **FINANCIAL IMPACT:** Grant award of \$750,000. **BACKGROUND:** The Putah Creek Accord directs Solano County Water Agency through the Lower Putah Creek Coordinating Committee (LPCCC) to protect and enhance the resources of Lower Putah Creek including restoration of Chinook salmon. Studies by UC Davis have identified spawning habitat as limiting Chinook salmon populations throughout California, including Lower Putah Creek. The LPCCC has identified further that spawning gravels have become cemented into a hard crust that is unusable by salmon unless scarified (loosened mechanically by an excavator). Through a series of gravel scarification projects, SCWA and the LPCCC have substantially increased Chinook salmon populations from about a dozen spawners in a typical year to an estimated peak of 1,700 fish in 2017. Through a recently completed planning project, the LPCCC has identified priority locations for further enhancement of Chinook salmon spawning habitat. The California Resources Agency Protecting California's Rivers, Streams and Watersheds Program has offered a directed action grant to enhance Chinook salmon spawning habitat on Lower Putah Creek. The Program requires a resolution of the Agency to accept the award. FINANCIAL IMPACT: Combined total cost for all three vehicles not to exceed \$105,000. Sufficient funding for these purchases is included in the Agency's FY 2020-2021 Solano Project budget. **BACKGROUND:** The United States Bureau of Reclamation contracts with the Solano County Water Agency (SCWA) for Operation & Maintenance (O&M) of the Solano Project, which includes Monticello Dam and Lake Berryessa, the Putah Diversion Dam and Lake Solano, the 33-mile long Putah South Canal, and Terminal Reservoir. SCWA in turn subcontracts with the Solano Irrigation District (SID) for the necessary O&M services. As a part of the O&M services, SID provides vehicles charged on an hourly basis ranging from \$20-\$33/hour. For heavily used vehicles, it is more cost effective for SCWA to purchase the vehicle as a capital asset (i.e., own vs rent). For FY 2020-2021, SCWA and SID have identified the need for three vehicle replacements specific to the Putah South Canal and Dam Operations. If approved, all vehicles will be purchased in conformance with the SCWA procurement policy. Local dealerships will be utilized if the purchase price is within 5% of the California State Contract list, consistent with SCWA's procurement policy for local businesses. DATE: February 11, 2021 Purchase of Four Replacement Vehicles for Water Agency Staff Use **SUBJECT: RECOMMENDATIONS:** Authorize General Manager to purchase the following four vehicles for use by Water Agency staff: two new 3/4ton trucks and two new 1-ton trucks. FINANCIAL IMPACT: Combined total cost for all four vehicles not to exceed \$230,000. Sufficient funding for these purchases is included in the Agency's FY 2020-2021 Solano Project budget. BACKGROUND: It is the Water Agency's policy to replace vehicles that are either over 10 years old or have over 100,000 miles of use. Staff are proposing to replace four vehicles; 2007 Chevrolet Silverado 2500 (assigned to the Supervising Water Resources Specialist), 2008 Ford F-350 (assigned to a Water Resources Technician), 2006 Chevrolet Colorado (assigned to a Water Resources Maintenance Aide) and 2001 Ford Expedition (assigned to a Water Resources Maintenance Aide). These vehicles are used for a variety of Water Agency functions, including facility maintenance, and habitat enhancement efforts along Putah Creek. They will be replaced with two new 1-ton trucks, such as 2020/21 Ford F350 or Ram 3500, and two new 3/4-ton trucks, such as 2020/21 Ford F250 or Ram 2500. If approved, dealerships located within Solano County will be utilized if the purchase price is within 5% of the California State Contract list or a cooperative purchasing contract, consistent with SCWA's procurement policy. SUBJECT: February General Manager's Report

Water Supply Outlook

The water supply outlook remains essentially unchanged from the prior month. The recent storms did bring significant snow to the Sierra Mountains, which should translate to at least a slight increase in the 2021 State Water Project allocation, now at 15 percent of full allocation. Locally, much of the rain was absorbed by the soil and as a result there was comparatively little runoff into Lake Berryessa. Nevertheless, as of this writing Lake Berryessa is at 75 percent of capacity and as reported in prior months, will provide full allocations in 2021, even if it remains dry the balance of this rainy season.

Post LNU Fire Preparations

There is of course a silver lining to the lack of rain – no significant soil erosion from the LNU burn area and no flooding in downstream areas. The rain we did receive has been enough to at least suspend the installation of any additional rock vanes on Pleasants Creek. The fact that significant rains held off until January allowed staff and the Water Agency's contractor to install more rock vanes than initially anticipated, and at this point only a few candidate locations remain. All things considered a huge success, which staff will highlight in a presentation to the Board in March.

In addition to installing rock vanes at various locations along Pleasants Creek, staff and Water Agency contractors completed two emergency stream debris removal projects, one in the Pleasants Creek drainage - removal of 27 logs and fallen trees - and the other within the Ulatis Creek drainage, near Bucktown – removal of 19 logs and fallen trees.

Development of Policy and Guidance for Water Agency Purchases of Real Estate

Staff is drafting a policy and protocols for purchases of real estate that will be presented for possible Board adoption at the March or April Board meeting. The policy will include oversite protocols by the Board's Executive Committee.

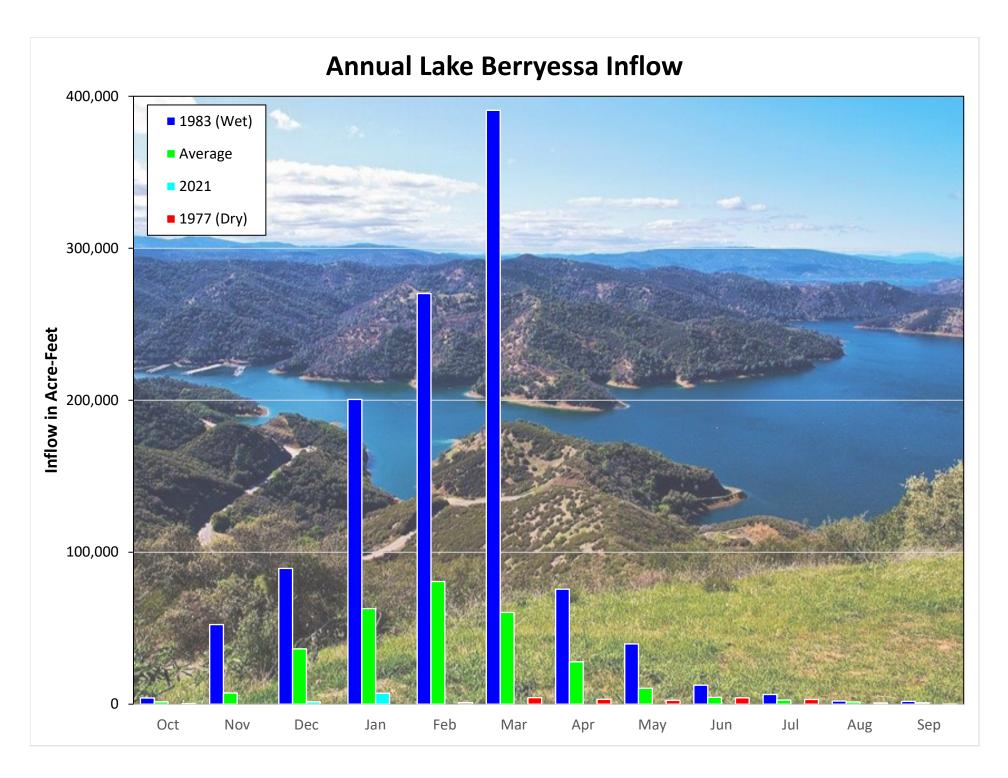


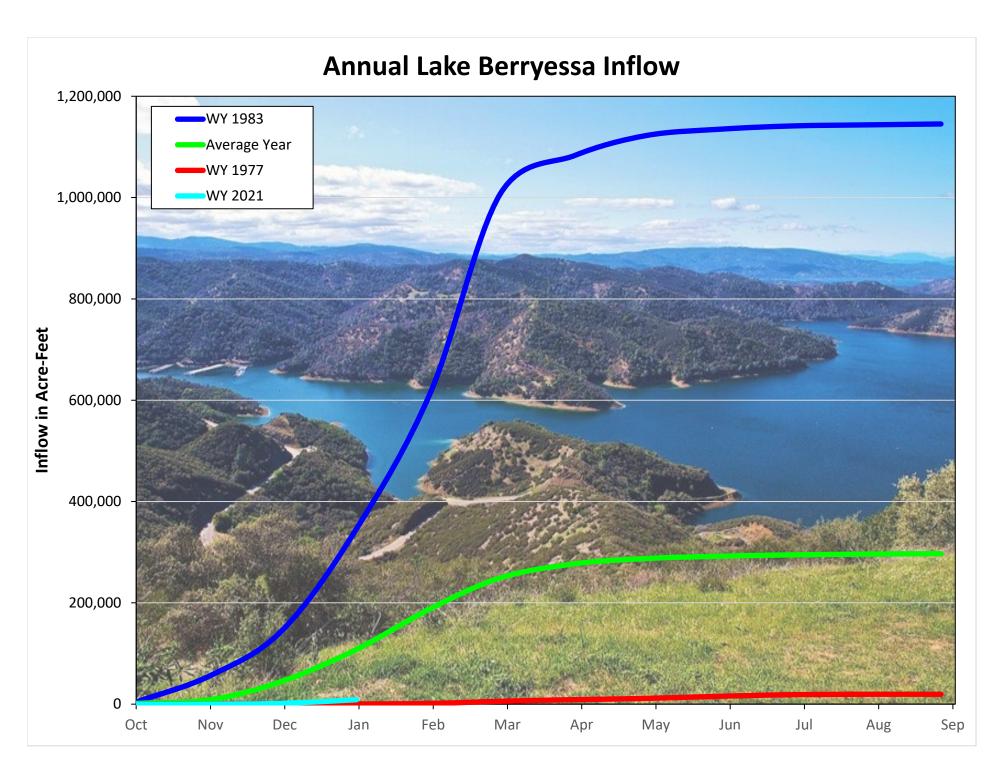
North Bay Aqueduct Pumping Restrictions

In late January a Longfin Smelt was detected in the vicinity of the North Bay Aqueduct's Barker Slough intake, prompting pumping restrictions that may remain in effect through March. As discussed at previous Board meetings, staff remains concerned that pumping restrictions necessitated by the presence of threatened or endangered fish species are likely to increase in frequency and duration as habitat restoration efforts in the Cache Slough Complex continue.

Lower Putah Creek Chinook Salmon

The Lower Putah Creek Chinook Salmon spawning season appears to have ended, which is typical as we approach mid-February. Approximately 140 adult Chinook Salmon were observed in Lower Putah Creek this season. Access to the favored spawning areas, upstream of the 505 Bridge, was restricted at times by the combination of a formidable beaver dam downstream of the Mace Road Bridge and delayed removal of the seasonal Dos Rios dam in the Yolo Bypass. Although the total numbers of salmon are relatively modest in comparison to recent years, there is at least initial optimism that at least some of the returning salmon originated from Lower Putah Creek in prior years – stay tuned.

Solano Water Advisory Commission Meeting Minutes December 2, 2020

The meeting was called to order at 12:37 PM.

1. Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the October 28, 2020 meeting were approved.

2. Emerging Issues

For LNU post-fire activities, rapid post-fire modeling work is being done for the Ulatis Creek Watershed. Creeks walks have also been done on both Ulatis and Alamo Creeks within the City Limits of Vacaville. On Pleasants Creek, the Water Agency has constructed a total of 62 cross vanes, with one more week of work expected. Water Agency staff are preparing for water quality monitoring around the Lake Berryessa Watershed and the Interdam Reach of Putah Creek. Staff have also completed installation of a new flood station on Ulatis Creek at Pleasants Valley Road. Roland is working on a draft PR article that will be fairly broad and will discuss post-fire activities done by SCWA.

On the Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP), the Agency has had many priorities but will be transitioning to the UWMP. The goal is to have Kennedy Jenks produce the Technical Memorandum by the end of December or early January. For the City of Benicia, the UWMP will be discussed at the December City Council meeting, and anticipate ramping up this effort in winter and spring. Appendix C of the UWMP will be an important issue. Additionally, the Technical Memorandum may need to be refined to carefully reflect the region's water policy concerns.

For the Advisory Commission and Committee Chairs, the Commission determined that Kyle Ochenduszko will stay on as the Advisory Commission Chair and Curtis Paxton will remain on the Water Policy Committee. For the Legislative Committee, a new representative will need to be selected, as Felix Riesenberg will be retiring. Several Commission members including Bryan Busch, Cary Keaten, and Beth Schoenberger expressed interest. Kyle will collect votes for the Legislative Committee representative, and notify the Water Agency of the results.

SCWA General Manager's Report

Roland informed the Commission that the two big items for the Board Agenda will be the 2021 Legislative Platform and Amendment 22 of the SWP Water Supply Contract. For the 2021 Legislative Platform the roadmap is very similar to the prior year. For Amendment 22, the Water Tools Amendment will be very beneficial as it provides greater flexibility, would allow trades of San Luis Carryover Water, allow for short-term transfers, and multiple transfers in a year. The flexibility would allow Solano agencies to recoup revenues and replenish water utility funds. Amendment 22 applies to Table A water, and does not resolve the North of Delta usage issues. The other SWCs will be moving for approval with their respective Boards.

On NBA issues, SCWA will be submitting a regional letter to DWR on the Final EIR of the Lookout Slough Restoration Project highlighting a few key points including Salinity/Bromide, Organic Carbon, and Cumulative Impacts. The Water Agency will also be providing information to Vallejo. The Water Agency anticipates moving forward on legal action, to ensure sure that DWR has mitigation measures for the NBA. Benicia completed a Condition Assessment for their water infrastructure, which details out infrastructure costs on dealing with poor water quality.

4. Groundwater Planning

Chris informed the Commission, that for groundwater there will be a Drinking Water Forum for the Solano Subbasin on December 17th to discuss SGMA.

5. Solano County Report

Misty provided an update to the Commission on County activities. The County is still very much focused on the LNU post-fire recovery, including tree removal, GIS storyboard development, assessments for Mix and Gates Canyon, working with crews to mitigate burnt structures, upcoming deadline for private Phase 2 removal, and obtaining Right of Entry documents for the public Phase 2 program.

BACKGROUND:

The Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) and Napa County were in negotiation over the past several years for Napa County to assume management and redevelopment of several Lake Berryessa resorts. In March of 2020, Reclamation and Napa County established their Managing Partners Agreement which is a long-term contract for Napa County to assume management and development of three resorts including Spanish Flat, Steele Canyon, and Monticello Shores. This past month, Napa hired a Concessionaire Manager who publicized a request for proposals for a concessionaire company to develop and manage the three resorts.

The SCWA Mussel Program currently operates at all six open resorts, this includes the boat wash-down station located at Steele Canyon Campground. With Napa County slating the resorts for development and the eventual reopening of Monticello Shores, SCWA is seeking the assurance that mussel prevention activities will still take place and be a priority at each resort. With the request for proposal closing March 2, 2021, SCWA would like to engage Napa County to ensure the continuation and support of the Lake Berryessa Mussel Prevention Program.

Dear Ms. Dillon:

This letter is to request the support of District 3 and the greater Napa County for the Lake Berryessa Mussel Prevention Program. For the past 9 years, the Solano County Water Agency (SCWA) has led the expanding efforts in protecting Lake Berryessa from the introduction of detrimental aquatic invasive species, and more specifically quagga and zebra mussels.

Quagga and Zebra (Dressenid) mussels pose a significant and imminent threat to the recreational and municipal water supply reservoirs of Napa County including Lake Berryessa and Lake Hennessey, and their respective distributaries. Dressenid mussels have already created serious and irreparable harm to bodies of water in California and throughout the United States. Both mussels are extremely prolific and by sheer numbers, capable of causing significant ecological damage, harming and or consuming native food resources, fouling water distribution systems, and imposing negative implications on both recreation and the local economy it supports.

SCWA in close collaboration with the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) and Concessionaires, have inspected over 75,000 watercraft at Lake Berryessa and purchased a mobile watercraft wash down station to assist in protecting the lake. SCWA has since gained the regional support of both Lake and Sonoma County water body managers, in helping to protect the region from mussel infestation. Unfortunately, neither SCWA or Reclamation have a law enforcement charter, and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) can only enforce Fish and Game Code on vessels with visible mussels.

However, Napa County and the Napa County Sherriff's Office already have a strong and welcomed presence at Lake Berryessa. With Napa County now a managing partner with Reclamation in resort development and SCWA being a lead agency on the mussel prevention program, the time is right for all agencies to begin regular collaborations and develop future partnerships. If mussels were to become established in Lake Berryessa, it would be devastating to the economic development of Lake Berryessa and eastern Napa County as well as to the Solano County community.



I would like to request the opportunity for Reclamation, Napa County, and SCWA to meet this February and discuss the potential collaboration and partnerships between our local agencies. SCWA already has a strong partnership with Napa County Flood, as well as the cities of Napa, American Canyon, and Calistoga on municipal water supply concerns. It would be a great opportunity to extend these partnerships to Lake Berryessa.
